# **Margot Held**

## Go to personal file

She emigrated from Germany to Tuscany to get her degree in medicine, then she started practising in Siena and studied to become a dentist. She had to move with her sister to the United Kingdom, where she could continue her work.

### **Student in Italy**

Margot was born in Wertheim (Baden-Württemberg) on 9 February 1912 to Max, a retailer, and Johanna Baer, both of Jewish origins<sup>1</sup>.

She was awarded a degree by the University of Siena on 10 November 1936, with a mark of 92/110. Later, she went all the way to Sardinia, in Cagliari, to undergo the exam to get her license, and opened a private practice in Siena town centre, in Viale Pannilunghi 10<sup>2</sup>.

In December 1937, she enrolled in a training course in odontology in Florence. After the racial laws, on 18 January 1939, she presented a formal request to abandon her studies and have her documentation back. Moreover, the Siena MD association disbarred her from the professional order<sup>3</sup>.

### **Escaping from the Continent**

After these events, we lose track of Margot. However, she probably managed to emigrate to the United Kingdom in 1939, together with her sister, Gertrude

(Gerti) Held (1915-1998), who, in September 1939, was a probationer in training at the Royal Surrey County Hospital in Guildford<sup>4</sup>. The documents at our disposal are scarce, but it makes sense to think that the two young doctors managed to find a provisory accommodation during the war. Their parents, who had remained in Germany, were eventually arrested and died in Auschwitz, probably in 1943<sup>5</sup>.

After the war, Margot continued her work as a doctor and married James
Oliphant Andrew, from whom she had two daughters. She died in London on
6 May 1993<sup>6</sup>.
