# Jacob (Jack) Beverstein

After graduating in medicine at Bologna in 1938, Jacob Beverstein emigrated to Great Britain, and then embarked for Canada in 1940 with his step-brother Lothar.

### From Germany to Italy

Jacob was born in 1912 in Wenkheim, a small village near Würzburg, the son of Hugo, a butcher, and Selma Heymann. His mother died in 1918, whereas his father was deported from the Warsaw ghetto and did not survive the Holocaust<sup>1</sup>. Jacob attended the Oberrealschule in Halberstadt, Saxony, and in 1932 he enrolled at the Faculty of Medicine in the University of Berlin, where he completed the first year course; in the academic year 1933-34 he transferred to Florence, where he studied up to year five, with an interval at Leipzig in year three; lastly he moved to Bologna for his final year and graduated on 11 July 1938 with a dissertation on the clinical usefulness of bronchography («L'utilità clinica della broncografia»), receiving a mark of 110. From July 1938 to January 1939 he held an internship at the Ospedale di San Giovanni in Persiceto and in Imola<sup>2</sup>.

## The emigration trail

He then emigrated to Great Britain: leaving Genoa on the Johan De Witt, a ship of the Nederland Royal Mail Line, he arrived in Southampton on 29 March

1939<sup>3</sup>. He was placed in Kitchener Camp, at Sandwich in Kent, a camp used for Jewish refugees<sup>4</sup>. With the onset of World War II, he was released on 14 December from internment as an enemy alien, since he was now a refugee; he moved to Ferring, in West Sussex, seeking work. On 3 July 1940 he set sail for Canada on the Ettrick, in the company of his brother Lothar (1921-2016), whom he had met again in London; their sister Ella Beverstein Kuvelmann (1914-2002) was living in Long Island<sup>5</sup>. He first settled in Toronto; in 1945 he appears to be working as a doctor at St Joseph's Hospital in London, Ontario; he later transferred to York, in the same area, where he worked as a surgeon<sup>6</sup>. Jacob married the Englishwoman Hope Nation (1914-2007), with whom he had two children. He died of a heart attack in 1983<sup>7</sup>.
