

Philip (Jeruchim Fischel) Ernst

Polish Student, from the USA to Italy

Jeruchim Fischel Ernst was born on June 15, 1910 in Zablotow (Austro-Hungarian Empire, later Poland, since 1945 Ukraine). He is the son of Anzel.

Ernst emigrated to New York in 1928 after receiving an affidavit from Frieda Ernst, who worked as a costume designer, and Pearl Brunstein, who worked as a cloak finisher; Frieda, born in 1910, came to New York a year before the arrival of Jeruchim Fischel and is presumed to be his older sister. Jeruchim Fischel moved to Brooklyn and obtained U.S. citizenship in 1934 with the name Philip Ernst¹.

Ernst came to Italy to study medicine and enrolled at the Università di Siena on December 14, 1935 (matriculation n. 1926). In December of 1937 he moved to Turin but returned to Siena on September 24, 1938 (on November 18, 1938 he enrolled in his sixth year at university). On November 17, 1938 the Questura (the public safety administration in charge of immigration affairs) inquired about the presence of Ernst at the university due to his status as *ebreo straniero*, or "foreign Jew". Shortly after, Philip requested to present his thesis. He graduated with a degree in medicine on July 15, 1939².

On April 6, 1940 Ernst left for Genoa on the boat *Manhattan* heading to the United States of America³. In his draft papers, compiled in October of 1940, the young medic claimed to be working at Unity Hospital at 1545 St. Johns Place, Brooklyn; he married Lida Lerner, who also graduated in medicine from the

Università di Siena in July of 1939. She was a resident at 165 Minna Street⁴. We do not know whether he was chosen for the draft or if he enlisted as a volunteer; he apparently departed from Casablanca for New York on July 7, 1944, which would imply that he worked with troops stationed in North Africa. After the war, the couple went on a trip to Israel, where they presumably had relatives; Lida and Ernst, who relocated to Mays Landing, New Jersey in 1950, had two children, Jerome and Doris; the family returned to Israel during the summer of 1953⁵. Philip Ernst died in Tel Aviv in July of 1980⁶.
